WE HEAR YOU!

It has been about a year since we implemented our new goal format for our lessons. In a society where the success of a program is measured based on its outcomes, we needed to change our lesson plan format to be able to better track our students' successes.

Each instructor writes five goals in the areas of fine motor, gross motor, cognitive, speech and behavior for each student for each 10-week session. The progress is tracked by the instructor after each lesson. At the end of the session, we document the success of the student in accomplishing the goals in each of these areas. After four sessions, we are able to report the following success rates:

• Fine Motor: 44% Gross Motor: 45% • Cognitive: 51% • Speech: 60% Behavioral: 63%

In addition, we sent a 10-question survey to our families to assess parent observations and program satisfaction and to find out what we could do better. Here is what we learned about our students:

- 60% have been riding at SRA for more than 3 years
- Almost 79% have experienced an increase in their balance and coordination
- Almost 90% noticed an increase in their self-confidence
- Almost 90% expressed satisfaction with our therapeutic riding and hippotherapy programs!

Further, we asked for your suggestions on how to improve the program, and what we heard was more communication and involvement! To this, we offer the following:

- Your instructor is available to answer questions regarding progress and goals. You will be receiving a brief biography about your instructor, which will include contact information for you to discuss your comments and questions.
- parents/guardians want the opportunity to be more involved helping around the farm during their students' lessons. To address this interest, we will be adding a parent communication board in the lounge. The board will include jobs that need to be done routinely and can be completed by anyone. You are welcome to help out while you wait. Many hands really do make light work!!



The reactions that most people have upon seeing **Sebastian**, **the minihorse**, are "Oh, look at the pony. He's so cute." "What does he do at the farm?" "Who rides him?"

The opportunity for education has begun. I say he's used as part of an equine therapy program. Sebastian pulls the cart in which an instructor and student ride. The student is taught how to drive the horse and cart.

Myriad concepts and skills can be learned by the student, some of which include grooming the horse, the sequence of harnessing, driving using the reins and whip, voice commands, proper posture when driving, rules of driving, de-harnessing the horse, and inspecting driving equipment and its proper storage.

The applications from learning to drive a horse to everyday life include eye-hand coordination, memory, sequencing, balance, coordination, use of core muscles, situational awareness, empathy for others—equine and human—independence, confidence, sense of accomplishment, joy and fun.

Sebastian, the mini-horse, would love to meet you. He lives to amaze.



It's Show Times by dettie tysen

SRA is pleased to announce that we will be attending a number of "outside" shows this spring and summer. These shows are in addition to Thorncroft, Special Olympics and the student horse show in September.

One weekend a month, BuxMont Riding Club, in Tylersport, PA, holds a Western show on Saturday during the day, a gymkhana that evening and English classes on Sunday. They also have several driving shows scheduled. Working in conjunction with SRA personnel and the parent of one of our students, BuxMont has designed two divisions to showcase our students' accomplishments.

One division will be for students who need a leader and possibly sidewalkers for them to show at their best. Within this division there will be an equitation class (rider is judged mostly on position and use of aids), a pleasure class (judged on the appropriateness of the horse for the class and rider), a mounted trail class (judged on accuracy of completing obstacles while on a horse) and an in-hand trail class (judged on accuracy of completing obstacles when leading a horse).

The second division includes the same classes, but in this division, riders must be off-lead. SRA personnel may be in the ring or walking near, but may not touch the horse or rider unless there is a safety issue.

In both divisions, riders may show English or Western and will be asked to trot/jog

These classes will be held Saturday mornings. If your rider likes the thrill and fast pace of gaming, then sign her or him up for the gymkhana. These competitions are held Saturday evenings starting at 4:30.

There will be several races (barrels, polebending, etc.) in which SRA riders will be able to compete—on lead or off.

For those riders who are able, SRA will be taking a group to the regular English classes one weekend. These riders will be in classes with a group of riders and are expected to be off-lead and independent. All classes will be on the flat at a walk and trot. These classes are held Sunday morning.

Finally, one weekend, Sebastian and his cart will be showing off in therapeutic driving class(es). We hope to have a few students participate in this event as well. These classes will be on Sunday also, but later in the morning or early in the afternoon.

In addition to the BuxMont shows, SRA will be taking a group of riders to North Ridge Farm to ride in their show in August, which is benefiting Grand View Hospital. We will also be attending several horse shows at the local 4-H center in Creamery. The classes will be the same as those at BuxMont. We also hope to find a few dressage shows to which we can take some students.

Please look in the lounge/arena for a notebook that will give additional information, including dates and costs, if known. Space is limited, so talk to your rider, check your calendars and sign up to join us for some fun riding experiences!

So that we can accommodate as many students as possible, we are limiting everyone to two shows. Please sign up for two shows and we will do our best to accommodate everyone's schedule. Please understand that signing the book commits you to the time and commits us to making sure we have a horse, volunteers and an instructor there for you.
